Study Guide

Thanks for joining us on this journey into the heart of God and the story He has been telling from the beginning of time! May the Lord richly bless you as you gaze again at His Word and consider His plan of salvation and redemption for humanity. This series is designed to be an experience-- not merely a "teaching."

Over the years I have done a lot of preaching and teaching about the ideas of the restoration of Israel, the One New Man, and the importance of unity in the Body of Messiah, but I have found that the most effective means of communicating this message is not in the form of simple lecture-- but rather in small group fellowship and study. People need time and space to digest and process what they are learning, and the freedom and safety to ask questions and study things out for themselves. It is with that goal in mind that we designed this study guide to accompany your journey through The Table.

We want to make a few recommendations on how you work through this content, without being overly prescriptive. The overall video content of this series is roughly 2.5 hours in length. However, this study guide is meant to help people process what they are learning during and between each video segment, so this series is not designed to be viewed all in one sitting. We recommend considering a 4 session study (we typically meet as a group one night a week) for you and/or your small group. The time in between sessions is important for processing and further Bible study and preparation for the next session. Individuals can easily study along at their own pace. Below is a framework that we believe will work well for most groups:

Week One: The Table Intro Video and Video 1 "Covenantal Foundations"

Week Two: Video 2 "The Birth of the Church Age" and Video 3 "Joint Heirs: The Family of

God"

Week Three: Video 4 "The Mystery of Israel's Salvation" and Video 5 "Mission Drift"

Week Four: Video 6 "The Restoration of Israel" and Video 7 "The 4 Winds"

There are accompanying questions following each video presentation that are designed to help facilitate group sharing, discussion, and processing. Feel free to use these questions as a "launching pad" and be free to add different questions that you believe are relevant, and explore the questions that surface in the hearts of your unique group members. The only dumb question is the one that is not asked! You may find some questions are better processed over the week and are worth revisiting the next time you gather as a group after people have had time to think and reflect.

People will be entering this study from many different experiences and faith points-- and this series is designed to support them as they walk through this content. In addition, while the videos themselves will touch on many scriptures, for the sake of time and brevity, we have included key scriptures we recommend you study prior to watching the next video in the reflect and prep section. These sections of scripture will help provide important context for the ground that will be covered in each video. Our goal and heart is to encourage Bible study, so we have also included an appendix of relevant scripture references and a recommended book list at the end of this guide for those interested in going deeper.

Finally, and perhaps most importantly, this series is designed to encourage fellowship and relationship. We have led many groups and have enjoyed sharing stories and having robust discussions over a shared meal each week. People each bring something to share and in the safety and comfort of a meal together, we get to know one another and learn from each other. If you would like to make this a Shabbat meal, we have also included information on how to do so in the appendix. Not only does this idea help support the goals of learning and understanding the content of the video series together; developing true fellowship, friendship, and unity is a worthy biblical pursuit in and of itself! We encourage you to consider enjoying a shared meal each week with your group and use that time to process last week's session and connect relationally with one another as you go on this journey together.

May the Lord richly bless you as you study His Word and encounter His heart afresh!

REFLECT AND PREP

This is a painful, eye-opening teaching for many people, as many have never heard some of this church history. How do you feel about what you explored and learned in this session?

Do you believe that separation from the Jewish roots of Christianity as taught by many early Gentile fathers had a negative effect on the shape and culture of Christianity? Why or why not?

What do you suppose we lost in the Church as a result of that separation? How should we approach the Jewish people? Was this history new to you? How does this impact you?

Is there any anti-semitism in your family and/or personal history and/or beliefs? If so, take some time to ask forgiveness and uproot it from your heart and generations.

50-117 AD

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE CHURCH

Ignatius of Antioch:

Taught that those who partake in Passover are partakers of those who killed Jesus

100-165 AD

Justin Martyr:

Claimed God's Covenant with Israel was no longer valid and that the gentiles had replaced the Jews.

130-202 AD Irenaeus

Declared that the lews were disinherited from the grace of God.

155- 230 AD Tertullian

Blamed the Jews for the death of Christ and argued that they had been permanently rejected by God

185- 254 AD • Eusebius

Taught that the promises in the OT were meant for the Gentile church and the curses were meant for Israel. Taught that the church was the "true Israel".

325 AD Constantine/Council of Nicea

Makes it a religion of the State, mixes with pagan practices, Outlaws celebrating Passover, mandates Sunday worship and not meeting in homes

347-420 AD Jerome

Described the Jews as "... serpents wearing the image of Judas. Their psalms and prayers are the braying of donkeys ... They are incapable of understanding Scripture"

349- 407 AD John Chrysostom

Preached a series of sermons against the Jews in which he stated, "The synagogue is not only a brothel and a theater, it is also a den of robbers and lodging place for wild beasts. Jews are inveterate murderers possessed by the Devil. Their debauchery and drunkenness gives them manners of a pig." He denied that Jews could ever receive forgiveness. He claimed it was a Christian duty to hate Jews. He claimed that Jews worshiped Satan. He was canonized a saint.

354-430 AD

St. Augustine

Asserted that the Jews deserved death but were destined to wander the earth to witness the victory of the Church over the synagogue."

1095-1291 AD THE CRUSADES

1473-1484 AD THE INQUISITION

1543 AD Martin Luther

describes the Jews as: A miserable accursed people, Stupid fools, Miserable, blind senseless,

Thieves and robbers, The great vermin of humanity, Lazy rogues, Blind and venomous Luther's suggestions for how to treat Jews?

- burn schools and synagogues
- · destroy Jewish homes
- · Confiscate the Talmud and prevent Rabbis from teaching
- · Take Jewish money and property
- · Place Jews into forced labor



SHABBAT DINNER EXPERIENCE

If you would like to make your dinner together a Shabbat meal there is some information below. This was the rhythm of the early church in homes and continues in Jewish homes around the world every Friday night. It can be a rich experience to enter into together as believers.

It starts with the lighting of the candles by the woman of the home who prays to welcome the Lord and focus on rest, worshiping Jesus as the light of the world.

Then the man of the home would bless the bread: Blessed are you, Lord our God, King of the Universe, who brings forth bread from the earth. Jesus, thank you for your body that was broken for us to bring our healing.

Break the bread, pass it, and eat.

Taking the cup of wine he blesses it:

Blessed are you, Lord our God, King of the Universe, who creates the fruit of the vine.

Jesus, thank you for your blood that was shed for us making us clean.

Pass the cup and drink.

The Father then prays a blessing over his wife and children.

NOTE: When you do this as a group it is fun to switch who leads it every week and/or let all pray blessings over their families. Also feel free to add your own flavor on this time.



RECIPE FOR CHALLAH BREAD

5 CUPS OF FLOUR
1/2 CUP SUGAR
1 PACKET OF INSTANT DRY YEAST
1/2 TSP SALT

Mix dry ingredients. Make a well in the dry ingredients and put in: 1 EGG 1/2 CUP VEGE OR CANOLA OIL 1 CUP OF LUKE-WARM WATER

Kneed until it comes together in a ball adding water as needed. Cover and let rise for 1 hour and then braid and let rise another hour covered with a towel on the baking sheet. You can brush a bit of egg white if you want a shiny finish, but it is optional. Bake at 365 degrees on the middle shelf of the oven. NOTE:We add another baking empty baking sheet on the bottom shelf of the oven to prevent the bottom from burning.
